

Letter-writing guide for NHS employees

As an NHS employee, your voice has added relevance for the local press. You are the ‘inside view’, the ‘person at the coal-face’, and so a letter from you will give the NHS debate a ‘face’ for the local press to use in getting your views across. If there is a local issue, such as a threatened hospital closure, then writing in about this and relating it to the NHS Bill will give you a far higher chance of getting into print than for the national press.

We’ve put together a [model letter](#) which you are free to use, but if you want to write your own completely then remember to keep it short (under 250 words), to the point and – above all – reflecting the true feelings you have. This is not ‘being unprofessional’ – true professionalism is about caring for standards and about being accountable, both of which are being whittled away as the NHS is broken apart.

The points you might want to stress could be chosen from:

- The NHS is being broken up and given increasingly to private companies.
- This is being proclaimed as ‘patient choice’ when in fact choices are disappearing for most people as budgets are tightened even further.
- The NHS has been shown to be the most efficient way of rationing health care in the face of ever-increasing demand, so that people who need help the most get it in the fairest way and do not have to face the nightmare of not being able to afford it. Which is the reality in the USA, which is the model we are being dragged towards in the name of ‘efficiency’.
- Changes to the law brought us to this. Only a further change to the law can stop the damage.
- The NHS Bill 2015 will restore the NHS to its founding principles, stop the effects of ‘marketization’ and breaking up, and protect the NHS from future attacks.
- Your own MP or other candidates for the election might have said something about the NHS Bill already – check on [<http://www.nhsbill2015.org/responses>]. Then you can either include their reply in your letter (but again, only a few dozen words) – or say they haven’t responded.
